

- Increase candidate success in completing and filing nomination petitions, campaign finance reports and other required items






Toss Your Hat in the Ring

- Over 1,000 people participated in Toss Your Hat in the Ring
- Panel of over 150 township supervisors, borough council and school board directors
- Collaboration with county election departments




As a result of your participation in the Toss Your Hat in the Ring workshop, how much more confident were you in your abilities to run for office or seek appointed office?






How useful for you were the following workshop topics as you considered running for local elected office or seeking appointed office?






Did you run for office in the May 2017 primary? If so, for which office did you run?
