Historically, NACDEP Annual Conference takes place between Sunday and Wednesday in a given week sometime from March through June. Favorable seasonal weather conditions should be considered when selecting dates. Furthermore, conflicts with other organizations such as the Community Development Society; National Extension Tourism (NET) Conference; other JCEP member organizations; state/regional organization conferences; and academic discipline conferences such as AAEA, Rural Sociology, etc., should also be considered in date selection.



IV. Please discuss the proposed conference site's ability to attract conference attendees²:

a. General information (please include information on airport airline service, population of host city, and other pertinent details, etc.)

The City of Asheville is home to unique culture, stunning scenery, a bounty of independent restaurants and local breweries, a thriving arts and performance scene and world class attractions. Ringed by the highest peaks in the east, Asheville sits on a plain atop the Blue Ridge Mountains at an altitude of 2,200 feet. This elevation difference over the piedmont of North Carolina and the low country of South Carolina provides a distinct climate advantage with cool summer temperatures.

Asheville has received too many accolades and recognitions to mention them all, including Top Three "Most Beautiful Places in America" by Good Morning America and one of Travel + Leisure's "World's Best Cities". The culture of Asheville will be intriguing to community development professionals, with a vibrant and entrepreneurial downtown area, several universities including UNC Asheville, Warren Wilson College and NCSU Mountain Horticultural Crops Research and Extension Center, innovative approaches to common community struggles such as food access and homelessness, and boundless natural, cultural and historic attractions. The population of Asheville in 2014 was 87,882 and is one of the fastest growing cities in North Carolina, increasing 27.6 percent since 2000.

Fifty percent of the U.S. population is within 600 miles of Asheville, which is located at the intersection of I-26 and I-40. Asheville Regional Airport was named the "best connected" airport of its size in the U.S. by a MIT study, is located 15 minutes from downtown, and has 4 major airlines with 50 round trips per day. Direct flights are available on American Airline to Charlotte, on United to Chicago and Newark, on Delta to Atlanta and LaGuardia and on Allegiant to many Florida cities as well as Baltimore/Washington D.C. Major airports nearby are Greenville Spartanburg (77 miles), Charlotte Douglas International (125 miles) and McGhee Tyson Airport in Knoxville (128 miles).

b. Examples of off-site experiential professional development opportunities.

Outdoor Adventure – There are so many possible activities for exploring adventure tourism including white water rafting, hiking, biking, trout fishing, and horseback riding in the more than a million acres of surrounding national forests.

History – The world famous Biltmore Estate includes tours of the magnificent home and gardens of George Vanderbilt. On the property there is an equestrian center that provides the experience of the estate on horseback and a winery. http://www.biltmore.com/

Downtown Revitalization -30 years ago downtown Asheville was a "boarded-up ghost town". There is a remarkable story of how philanthropist Julian Price and other visionaries were able to bring Asheville back to the current vibrant community.

Arts and Culture – The River Arts District located on the French Broad River just west of downtown is a place to discover 185 artists with studios in 25 buildings including converted warehouses and industrial buildings. Mixed in with the studios and galleries are café's, coffee shops, BBQ joints and more. http://www.riverartsdistrict.com A tour could also include the 10 murals in downtown, the Asheville Art Museum and the Folk Art Center on the Blue Ridge Parkway.

Native American Culture – 45 minutes from Asheville the Eastern Band of the Cherokee Indian Reservation is 56,000 acres of federally held land (called the Qualla Boundary) is full of opportunities to learn about the Native American Culture in museums, outdoor drama and a shopping village. A luxury Harrah's Casino is located in the town of Cherokee along with the entrance to the Great Smoky Mountain National Park. NCSU operates a EBCI Cooperative Extension Unit that extends over five counties in the reservation that could be involved in this tour.

Beer Tours – With 25 breweries many tours can be developed around brewing. Whether taking the Bruise Cruise or the Pub-cycle in the downtown area, or visiting the Sierra Nevada Brewery for a tour or an organic hop yard in the mountains, beer fans will be happy with a tour in Asheville.

Culinary and Local Foods – Farm to Table Tours are available here http://www.ashevillefarmtotabletours.com/ or a custom food system tour could be developed including farms, local food restaurants, community gardens, farmers markets (called tailgate markets), food product incubation and processing at Blue Ridge Food Ventures.

Sustainability – Warren Wilson College, a liberal arts school originally founded as the Asheville Farm School for educating mountain boys by Presbyterian missionaries has a strong service program for students. The campus features many sustainability initiatives including the Green Walkabout an experiential sustainability program for students.

Gardens – The North Carolina Arboretum and the Botanical Gardens of Asheville are great ways to explore nature trails and the indigenous species of mountain plants. Craggy Gardens is a spot on the Blue Ridge Parkway a short distance and 3,500 feet up from Asheville that provides a short hike and amazing views on top of the mountain (the Catawba rhododendron are at their peak in mid-June).

Appalachian Trail – Travel to Hot Springs where the AT follows the main street into town. Hike up to Max Patch, for a gorgeous view of the Smoky Mountains to the west and Mount Mitchell, provided by a large bald created by ranchers who cleared the mountain in the 1800's. Stop back in Hot Springs for a soak in the famous natural spring tubs. https://www.romanticasheville.com/max-patch

WNC Cheese Trail – Award winning cheeses are available for tasting while touring four local creameries in the Western North Carolina countryside. http://www.wnccheesetrail.org/

Equitable and Sustainable Tourism – Visit entrepreneurs who are part of the People-First Tourism program in Western North Carolina, providing authentic tourism experiences through the P1T interface. People-First Tourism is a NCSU Tourism Extension program helping entrepreneurs earn a sustainable and dignified income as they offer tourists experiences on farms, in the arts, story-telling and more. https://www.peoplefirsttourism.com/



c. Tourism and recreational opportunities for both participants and guests.

Surrounded by over a million acres of national forest, Asheville offers up myriad opportunities for outdoor adventure, unconventional team-building and other group activities. Whether it's hiking, rafting, zip lining, climbing or cycling, meeting attendees will enjoy the opportunity to discover the natural world in all its glory.

With 6 James Beard nominated chefs and 14 farmers markets, Asheville is known as <u>Foodtopia</u>®. Asheville chefs incorporate exquisite local farm-to-table fare into catering menus and elevate the everyday break and banquet to something outstanding. There are also a number of food adventures and culinary experiences for groups including wild food foraging and farm tours. Our more than 250 independent restaurants will tempt attendees to explore our enticing dining scene on a free evening.

Asheville is also home to over 25 breweries with tours and tastings available to bring out the inner beer expert in our visitors.

Long revered as a therapeutic escape, Asheville's tradition of health and wellness rejuvenates visitors. This reputation extends both to spas and wellness centers located on property at many local hotels, including the Omni Grove Park's 43,000 square foot subterranean spa, and to a wealth of healthy food, fitness and mindfulness options, perfect for mountaintop meditation or social responsibility projects.

Asheville is an extremely popular tourist area, which will be ideal for conference attendees who would like to extend their time with a family vacation. Rental cabins and lakeside homes abound in the surrounding mountains and picturesque small mountain towns. There are endless day excursions to places such as the Great Smoky Mountain National Park, the Appalachian Trail, the Blue Ridge Parkway, Sliding Rock and many other waterfalls in the Pisagah National Forest, Grandfather Mountain, Chimney Rock, Linville Caverns, Native American Culture at the Museum of the Cherokee Indian and the Nantahala Outdoor Center.

In Downtown Asheville a traveler will find an exciting eclectic atmosphere with music in the streets as well as "buskers" (street performers) and drum circles. Visitors can experience amazing restaurants, breweries, independent book stores, shopping, a chocolate tour, a drink in one of the rooftop bars and more.

2019 NACDEP Conference Host Proposal Asheville, North Carolina

Host State Capacity:

North Carolina State University is partnering with North Carolina A & T State University in proposing that Asheville, NC be the host site for the 2019 NACDEP Conference. Both universities have Extension Specialists and Agents working in Community Development. Extension programs that will also be involved are NCSU Extension Tourism and Local Foods Flagship Program.

NCSU Extension is tentatively pledging a \$5,000 Sponsorship for the conference.

The Asheville Convention and Visitors Bureau is also offering \$1,000 incentive funds which can be used for transportation, offsite activity or as a credit to the hotel Master Bill. Services are also provided by Asheville CVB free of charge for the event.
